In addition, to accommodate the increased number of MAT patients who expressed interest in the new group format, an additional MAT group day was added on Tuesdays with plans to expand the group format to additional CoRR campuses. The results of the provider satisfaction surveys regarding the MAT program will be added once all results are received. Conclusion: Medication-assisted treatment (MAT) has proven to be the most effective evidence-based treatment option for patients with opioid dependence combined with psychosocial treatment. Treatment of opioid misuse disorder with buprenorphine and naloxone and/or buprenorphine has been proven to be safe and an effective treatment option in the office-based setting to decrease opioid use and cravings. Due to the new and evolving nature of the field of substance abuse and medication assisted treatment, it would be beneficial to obtain further research regarding best practices for providing MAT services to underserved non-metropolitan communities.
