After considerable research, it became apparent that critics in favour of his notion of 'negative capability' unfairly subjugated Keats' poetic concept of 'light and shade'. Hence, this dissertation's concern is correlating Keats' perception of 'light and shade' with regards to his poem Ode to a Nightingale. In order to ascertain how Keats' concept works, it will naturally be necessary to clearly define what his own perspective and parameters were for his theory; this will be achieved via an exploration of both his poems and letters. Once the nature of 'light and shade' has been established, I will then appraise its influence on Ode to a Nightingale through a 'close reading' of the poem. This analysis will essentially follow the poem's arrangement from stanza one through to its conclusion in stanza eight, though obviously there will be a considerable amount of cross-referencing between the stanzas.
