SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY: UNLOCKING COMMUNICATION SKILLS STEP-BY-STEP

SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY PLAY A CRUCIAL ROLE IN HELPING INDIVIDUALS, ESPECIALLY CHILDREN, DEVELOP THE ABILITY TO ORGANIZE THOUGHTS, ACTIONS, AND LANGUAGE IN A LOGICAL AND COHERENT ORDER. SEQUENCING IS A FUNDAMENTAL COGNITIVE SKILL THAT IMPACTS EVERYDAY COMMUNICATION, STORYTELLING, COMPREHENSION, AND EVEN SOCIAL INTERACTIONS. SPEECH THERAPISTS OFTEN FOCUS ON SEQUENCING GOALS TO SUPPORT CLIENTS WHO STRUGGLE WITH ORGANIZING THEIR SPEECH, FOLLOWING MULTI-STEP INSTRUCTIONS, OR NARRATING EVENTS CLEARLY.

UNDERSTANDING WHAT SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY ENTAILS AND HOW TARGETED SEQUENCING GOALS CAN ENHANCE LANGUAGE AND COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT OPENS UP NEW PATHWAYS FOR EFFECTIVE INTERVENTION. WHETHER WORKING WITH CHILDREN WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DELAYS, INDIVIDUALS RECOVERING FROM BRAIN INJURIES, OR CLIENTS WITH LANGUAGE PROCESSING DISORDERS, SEQUENCING GOALS SERVE AS STEPPING STONES TOWARD CLEARER, MORE STRUCTURED COMMUNICATION.

WHAT IS SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY?

SEQUENCING REFERS TO THE ABILITY TO ARRANGE INFORMATION, EVENTS, OR ACTIONS IN A LOGICAL ORDER. IN SPEECH THERAPY, SEQUENCING SKILLS RELATE TO HOW A PERSON CAN ORDER THEIR THOUGHTS AND WORDS TO MAKE SENSE TO THE LISTENER. THIS SKILL IS ESSENTIAL FOR TELLING STORIES, EXPLAINING PROCESSES, FOLLOWING DIRECTIONS, AND UNDERSTANDING NARRATIVES.

SPEECH THERAPISTS OFTEN ASSESS SEQUENCING BY EXAMINING HOW CLIENTS MANAGE TASKS LIKE:

- RETELLING A STORY IN THE CORRECT ORDER
- FOLLOWING MULTI-STEP COMMANDS
- DESCRIBING DAILY ROUTINES
- ORGANIZING SENTENCES TO FORM COHERENT EXPLANATIONS

WHEN SEQUENCING IS IMPAIRED, IT CAN MANIFEST AS JUMBLED SPEECH, DIFFICULTY UNDERSTANDING CAUSE AND EFFECT, OR CHALLENGES IN COMPLETING TASKS THAT REQUIRE MULTIPLE STEPS.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY

SEQUENCING GOALS ARE INTEGRAL TO SPEECH THERAPY BECAUSE THEY DIRECTLY IMPACT COMMUNICATION EFFECTIVENESS AND ACADEMIC SUCCESS. WITHOUT STRONG SEQUENCING ABILITIES, INDIVIDUALS MAY STRUGGLE WITH:

- READING COMPREHENSION, AS UNDERSTANDING STORY ORDER IS VITAL
- WRITING NARRATIVES OR ESSAYS THAT FLOW LOGICALLY
- SOCIAL CONVERSATIONS THAT RELY ON SHARED UNDERSTANDING OF EVENTS
- EXECUTING TASKS THAT INVOLVE MULTIPLE STEPS, SUCH AS COOKING OR DRESSING

BY SETTING CLEAR SEQUENCING GOALS, SPEECH THERAPISTS CAN TAILOR INTERVENTIONS TO IMPROVE A CLIENT'S ABILITY TO THINK AND SPEAK IN ORGANIZED WAYS, THUS ENHANCING OVERALL LANGUAGE USE AND DAILY FUNCTIONING.

COMMON SEQUENCING CHALLENGES ADDRESSED IN SPEECH THERAPY

MANY CLIENTS EXPERIENCE SEQUENCING DIFFICULTIES DUE TO VARIOUS UNDERLYING CONDITIONS. SOME OF THE MOST COMMON CHALLENGES INCLUDE:

1. DEVELOPMENTAL DELAYS AND LANGUAGE DISORDERS

CHILDREN WITH DEVELOPMENTAL LANGUAGE DISORDER (DLD) OR SPEECH DELAYS OFTEN HAVE TROUBLE ORGANIZING THEIR THOUGHTS IN A SEQUENCE. THEY MIGHT JUMBLE EVENTS OR OMIT IMPORTANT DETAILS, MAKING THEIR COMMUNICATION HARD TO FOLLOW.

2. AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER (ASD)

SEQUENCING CHALLENGES ARE COMMON IN INDIVIDUALS WITH ASD, AFFECTING BOTH VERBAL AND NONVERBAL COMMUNICATION. DIFFICULTY IN UNDERSTANDING THE ORDER OF SOCIAL EVENTS OR ROUTINES CAN LEAD TO CONFUSION AND FRUSTRATION.

3. TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY (TBI) AND APHASIA

ADULTS RECOVERING FROM BRAIN INJURIES OR STROKES MAY LOSE SEQUENCING SKILLS THAT WERE ONCE AUTOMATIC. THIS CAN IMPACT THEIR ABILITY TO TELL STORIES, GIVE DIRECTIONS, OR EVEN ENGAGE IN SIMPLE CONVERSATIONS.

4. LEARNING DISABILITIES

STUDENTS WITH DYSLEXIA OR OTHER LEARNING DISABILITIES MAY STRUGGLE WITH SEQUENCING IN READING AND WRITING, WHICH SPEECH THERAPY CAN HELP ADDRESS THROUGH TARGETED GOALS.

SETTING EFFECTIVE SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY

CREATING EFFECTIVE SEQUENCING GOALS REQUIRES A PERSONALIZED APPROACH BASED ON THE CLIENT'S AGE, ABILITIES, AND SPECIFIC CHALLENGES. GOALS SHOULD BE MEASURABLE, ACHIEVABLE, AND RELEVANT TO EVERYDAY COMMUNICATION.

EXAMPLES OF SEQUENCING GOALS

- THE CLIENT WILL RETELL A FAMILIAR STORY USING CORRECT CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER WITH 80% ACCURACY.
- THE CLIENT WILL FOLLOW A THREE-STEP VERBAL INSTRUCTION DURING CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES IN 4 OUT OF 5 TRIALS.
- THE CLIENT WILL DESCRIBE DAILY ROUTINES IN SEQUENTIAL ORDER WITH APPROPRIATE USE OF TEMPORAL WORDS (FIRST, NEXT, LAST).
- THE CLIENT WILL ORGANIZE A SERIES OF PICTURES TO TELL A LOGICAL STORY SEQUENCE INDEPENDENTLY.

STRATEGIES FOR ACHIEVING SEQUENCING GOALS

SPEECH THERAPISTS EMPLOY VARIOUS TECHNIQUES TO HELP CLIENTS MASTER SEQUENCING SKILLS, INCLUDING:

- **VISUAL SUPPORTS:** USING PICTURE CARDS, STORYBOARDS, OR GRAPHIC ORGANIZERS TO VISUALLY MAP OUT SEQUENCES.
- **MODELING AND REPETITION:** DEMONSTRATING CORRECT SEQUENCING AND ENCOURAGING PRACTICE THROUGH REPETITION.
- **USE OF TEMPORAL LANGUAGE:** TEACHING WORDS LIKE "BEFORE," "AFTER," "FIRST," "THEN," AND "FINALLY" TO

CLARIFY ORDER.

- **INTERACTIVE STORYTELLING:** ENGAGING CLIENTS IN CREATING OR RETELLING STORIES THAT REQUIRE SEQUENCING.
- **MULTI-SENSORY ACTIVITIES:** INCORPORATING HANDS-ON TASKS SUCH AS ARRANGING OBJECTS OR PERFORMING STEP-BY-STEP ACTIVITIES.

THE ROLE OF SEQUENCING IN EVERYDAY COMMUNICATION AND LEARNING

SEQUENCING SKILLS EXTEND FAR BEYOND THE THERAPY ROOM. THEY ARE FUNDAMENTAL TO SO MANY ASPECTS OF DAILY LIFE AND LEARNING EXPERIENCES.

ACADEMIC BENEFITS

IN THE CLASSROOM, SEQUENCING SUPPORTS READING COMPREHENSION BY HELPING STUDENTS UNDERSTAND STORY PLOTS AND CAUSE-EFFECT RELATIONSHIPS. WRITING ASSIGNMENTS ALSO HEAVILY RELY ON THE ABILITY TO ORGANIZE IDEAS LOGICALLY. SPEECH THERAPY THAT TARGETS SEQUENCING CAN THEREFORE COMPLEMENT ACADEMIC GOALS AND IMPROVE SCHOOL PERFORMANCE.

SOCIAL COMMUNICATION

GOOD SEQUENCING SKILLS HELP INDIVIDUALS SHARE EXPERIENCES CLEARLY AND MAKE CONVERSATIONS EASIER TO FOLLOW. FOR CHILDREN, THIS CAN MEAN IMPROVED PEER INTERACTIONS AND SOCIAL CONFIDENCE. FOR ADULTS, IT CAN ENHANCE STORYTELLING, EXPLANATIONS, AND EVEN JOB-RELATED COMMUNICATION.

PRACTICAL LIFE SKILLS

SEQUENCING IS KEY IN EVERYDAY TASKS LIKE COOKING, GETTING DRESSED, OR COMPLETING CHORES. SPEECH THERAPISTS OFTEN ENCOURAGE CLIENTS TO PRACTICE SEQUENCING DURING THESE ROUTINES TO REINFORCE SKILLS IN NATURAL CONTEXTS.

MEASURING PROGRESS IN SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY

TRACKING PROGRESS IS ESSENTIAL TO ENSURE THAT SEQUENCING GOALS ARE EFFECTIVE AND TO ADJUST THERAPY PLANS AS NEEDED. SPEECH THERAPISTS USE VARIOUS METHODS TO MEASURE IMPROVEMENTS, SUCH AS:

- OBSERVING THE CLIENT'S ABILITY TO RETELL STORIES OR COMPLETE SEQUENCES DURING SESSIONS
- USING STANDARDIZED ASSESSMENTS TARGETING SEQUENCING AND NARRATIVE SKILLS
- GATHERING INPUT FROM PARENTS, TEACHERS, OR CAREGIVERS ABOUT FUNCTIONAL COMMUNICATION CHANGES
- ANALYZING THE ACCURACY AND INDEPENDENCE WITH WHICH THE CLIENT FOLLOWS MULTI-STEP INSTRUCTIONS

INCREMENTAL SUCCESSES, EVEN SMALL ONES, INDICATE POSITIVE GROWTH TOWARD MORE COMPLEX SEQUENCING TASKS.

TIPS FOR PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS TO SUPPORT SEQUENCING SKILLS AT HOME

SUPPORTING SEQUENCING GOALS OUTSIDE OF THERAPY SESSIONS CAN SIGNIFICANTLY BOOST A CLIENT'S PROGRESS. HERE ARE SOME PRACTICAL WAYS TO ENCOURAGE SEQUENCING DEVELOPMENT AT HOME:

1. **READ AND DISCUSS STORIES:** AFTER READING A BOOK, ASK YOUR CHILD TO RETELL THE STORY IN THEIR OWN WORDS, FOCUSING ON THE ORDER OF EVENTS.
2. **USE DAILY ROUTINES:** ENCOURAGE YOUR CHILD TO DESCRIBE THE STEPS IN GETTING READY FOR SCHOOL OR MAKING A SANDWICH.
3. **PLAY SEQUENCING GAMES:** SIMPLE GAMES LIKE ARRANGING PICTURE CARDS OR CREATING "FIRST, NEXT, LAST" STORIES CAN MAKE LEARNING FUN.
4. **ENCOURAGE USE OF TEMPORAL WORDS:** PROMPT YOUR CHILD TO USE WORDS LIKE "THEN" AND "FINALLY" WHEN DESCRIBING ACTIVITIES.
5. **BREAK TASKS INTO STEPS:** WHEN GIVING INSTRUCTIONS, BREAK THEM DOWN INTO SMALLER PARTS AND REVIEW THE SEQUENCE TOGETHER.

BY INTEGRATING THESE ACTIVITIES INTO EVERYDAY INTERACTIONS, PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS CAN REINFORCE THE SEQUENCING SKILLS TARGETED DURING SPEECH THERAPY.

INTEGRATING SEQUENCING GOALS INTO BROADER SPEECH THERAPY PLANS

SEQUENCING IS INTERCONNECTED WITH MANY OTHER LANGUAGE AND COGNITIVE SKILLS. EFFECTIVE SPEECH THERAPY OFTEN COMBINES SEQUENCING GOALS WITH OBJECTIVES TARGETING VOCABULARY, SYNTAX, SOCIAL COMMUNICATION, AND EXECUTIVE FUNCTIONING.

FOR EXAMPLE, A THERAPIST MIGHT WORK ON SEQUENCING NARRATIVES WHILE SIMULTANEOUSLY BUILDING SENTENCE STRUCTURE OR TEACHING PERSPECTIVE-TAKING SKILLS. THIS HOLISTIC APPROACH ENSURES THAT SEQUENCING IMPROVEMENTS TRANSLATE INTO MORE MEANINGFUL AND FUNCTIONAL COMMUNICATION OUTCOMES.

SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY IS A DYNAMIC AND ESSENTIAL PART OF HELPING INDIVIDUALS BUILD CLEARER, MORE ORGANIZED COMMUNICATION SKILLS. BY FOCUSING ON THE LOGICAL ORDER OF THOUGHTS, WORDS, AND ACTIONS, SPEECH THERAPISTS EMPOWER CLIENTS TO EXPRESS THEMSELVES MORE EFFECTIVELY, SUCCEED ACADEMICALLY, AND NAVIGATE DAILY LIFE WITH GREATER CONFIDENCE. WITH THE RIGHT STRATEGIES AND SUPPORT, SEQUENCING CAN TRANSFORM FROM A CHALLENGING HURDLE INTO A MASTERED SKILL THAT OPENS THE DOOR TO RICHER INTERACTIONS AND LEARNING.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY?

SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY REFERS TO THE ABILITY TO ORGANIZE SOUNDS, WORDS, OR EVENTS IN A LOGICAL ORDER, WHICH IS ESSENTIAL FOR EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION AND STORYTELLING.

WHY IS SEQUENCING IMPORTANT FOR SPEECH DEVELOPMENT?

SEQUENCING HELPS INDIVIDUALS UNDERSTAND AND PRODUCE COHERENT SPEECH, FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS, AND IMPROVE LANGUAGE COMPREHENSION, MAKING IT A CRITICAL SKILL IN SPEECH DEVELOPMENT.

HOW CAN SPEECH THERAPISTS ASSESS SEQUENCING SKILLS?

SPEECH THERAPISTS ASSESS SEQUENCING SKILLS THROUGH ACTIVITIES LIKE RETELLING STORIES, ARRANGING PICTURES IN ORDER, FOLLOWING MULTI-STEP DIRECTIONS, AND USING SEQUENCING CARDS OR APPS.

WHAT ARE EFFECTIVE TECHNIQUES TO IMPROVE SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY?

TECHNIQUES INCLUDE USING VISUAL AIDS, PRACTICING STORY RETELLING, ENGAGING IN STEP-BY-STEP TASKS, INCORPORATING SEQUENCING GAMES, AND GRADUALLY INCREASING COMPLEXITY BASED ON THE INDIVIDUAL'S PROGRESS.

CAN SEQUENCING DIFFICULTIES AFFECT ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE?

YES, SEQUENCING DIFFICULTIES CAN IMPACT READING COMPREHENSION, WRITING, MATH PROBLEM-SOLVING, AND FOLLOWING CLASSROOM INSTRUCTIONS, MAKING IT IMPORTANT TO ADDRESS IN SPEECH THERAPY.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY: ENHANCING COMMUNICATION THROUGH STRUCTURED INTERVENTION

SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY FORM A CRITICAL COMPONENT IN THE TREATMENT PLANS DEVISED BY SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGISTS (SLPs) TO IMPROVE CLIENTS' COMMUNICATIVE ABILITIES. SEQUENCING—THE ABILITY TO LOGICALLY ORDER EVENTS, ACTIONS, OR LANGUAGE UNITS—IS FOUNDATIONAL TO EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION. WHETHER ADDRESSING LANGUAGE DELAYS, APHASIA, APRAXIA, OR OTHER SPEECH AND LANGUAGE DISORDERS, TARGETING SEQUENCING IN THERAPY CAN SUBSTANTIALLY ENHANCE NARRATIVE SKILLS, COMPREHENSION, AND EXPRESSIVE LANGUAGE. THIS ARTICLE EXPLORES THE IMPORTANCE OF SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY, HOW THEY ARE FORMULATED, AND THEIR IMPACT ON DIVERSE POPULATIONS.

THE ROLE OF SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY

SEQUENCING IS THE COGNITIVE PROCESS BY WHICH INDIVIDUALS ARRANGE INFORMATION, THOUGHTS, OR ACTIONS IN A MEANINGFUL AND CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER. IN SPEECH THERAPY, SEQUENCING GOALS OFTEN ADDRESS THE CLIENT'S ABILITY TO ORGANIZE VERBAL OUTPUT INTO COHERENT STATEMENTS, STORIES, OR INSTRUCTIONS. THIS SKILL IS ESSENTIAL NOT ONLY FOR EVERYDAY CONVERSATION BUT ALSO FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS AND SOCIAL INTERACTION.

CLIENTS WITH LANGUAGE IMPAIRMENTS FREQUENTLY STRUGGLE WITH SEQUENCING DUE TO DIFFICULTIES IN MEMORY, ATTENTION, OR EXECUTIVE FUNCTION. FOR EXAMPLE, CHILDREN WITH DEVELOPMENTAL LANGUAGE DISORDER (DLD) MAY HAVE TROUBLE RETELLING A STORY IN THE CORRECT ORDER, WHILE ADULTS RECOVERING FROM TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY (TBI) MIGHT FIND SEQUENCING CHALLENGING DUE TO IMPAIRED COGNITIVE PROCESSING. SPEECH THERAPISTS INCORPORATE SEQUENCING GOALS TO HELP THESE INDIVIDUALS STRUCTURE THEIR THOUGHTS AND COMMUNICATE MORE EFFECTIVELY.

WHY SEQUENCING GOALS ARE INTEGRAL TO THERAPY PLANS

SEQUENCING GOALS ARE OFTEN EMBEDDED WITHIN BROADER LANGUAGE OBJECTIVES, SUCH AS IMPROVING EXPRESSIVE LANGUAGE OR NARRATIVE SKILLS. PROPER SEQUENCING ALLOWS CLIENTS TO:

- CONSTRUCT LOGICAL NARRATIVES AND EXPLANATIONS
- FOLLOW AND GIVE MULTI-STEP INSTRUCTIONS
- ENHANCE COMPREHENSION OF COMPLEX LANGUAGE
- DEVELOP PROBLEM-SOLVING AND PLANNING ABILITIES

BY IMPROVING THESE COMPETENCIES, SEQUENCING GOALS FACILITATE OVERALL COMMUNICATION DEVELOPMENT, WHICH CAN TRANSLATE INTO BETTER ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND SOCIAL INTEGRATION.

FORMULATING EFFECTIVE SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY

THE DEVELOPMENT OF SEQUENCING GOALS REQUIRES A THOROUGH ASSESSMENT OF THE CLIENT'S CURRENT ABILITIES AND CHALLENGES. SPEECH THERAPISTS OFTEN USE STANDARDIZED ASSESSMENTS ALONGSIDE INFORMAL OBSERVATIONS TO EVALUATE SEQUENCING SKILLS. BASED ON THIS DATA, GOALS ARE TAILORED TO THE INDIVIDUAL'S AGE, DIAGNOSIS, AND FUNCTIONAL NEEDS.

CHARACTERISTICS OF WELL-DEFINED SEQUENCING GOALS

EFFECTIVE SEQUENCING GOALS IN SPEECH THERAPY ARE:

- **SPECIFIC:** CLEARLY DEFINE THE SEQUENCING SKILL TO BE TARGETED, SUCH AS ORDERING EVENTS IN A STORY OR ARRANGING STEPS IN A PROCEDURAL TASK.
- **MEASURABLE:** INCLUDE CRITERIA FOR SUCCESS, LIKE ACCURATELY SEQUENCING FIVE EVENTS WITH 80% ACCURACY OVER THREE CONSECUTIVE SESSIONS.
- **ACHIEVABLE:** SET REALISTIC EXPECTATIONS BASED ON THE CLIENT'S ABILITIES AND DEVELOPMENTAL STAGE.
- **RELEVANT:** ALIGN WITH THE CLIENT'S COMMUNICATIVE NEEDS, WHETHER ACADEMIC, SOCIAL, OR VOCATIONAL.
- **TIME-BOUND:** ESTABLISH A TIMEFRAME FOR ACHIEVING THE GOAL TO FACILITATE PROGRESS MONITORING.

FOR INSTANCE, A SEQUENCING GOAL FOR A CHILD WITH LANGUAGE DELAYS MIGHT BE: "THE CLIENT WILL SEQUENCE FOUR-PICTURE CARDS TO RETELL A STORY WITH 90% ACCURACY IN THREE CONSECUTIVE SESSIONS." SUCH PRECISION ENABLES EFFECTIVE TRACKING AND ADJUSTMENTS.

EXAMPLES OF SEQUENCING GOALS ACROSS DIFFERENT POPULATIONS

1. **CHILDREN WITH LANGUAGE DELAYS:** SEQUENCING DAILY ROUTINES OR STORY EVENTS TO ENHANCE NARRATIVE SKILLS.
2. **ADULTS WITH APHASIA:** ORDERING STEPS INVOLVED IN COMMON ACTIVITIES, SUCH AS MAKING COFFEE, TO IMPROVE FUNCTIONAL COMMUNICATION.
3. **INDIVIDUALS WITH APRAXIA OF SPEECH:** SEQUENCING MULTISYLLABIC WORD PARTS OR PHRASES TO SUPPORT MOTOR PLANNING AND VERBAL OUTPUT.

4. **STUDENTS WITH LEARNING DISABILITIES:** SEQUENCING INSTRUCTIONS FOR ACADEMIC TASKS TO IMPROVE COMPREHENSION AND TASK COMPLETION.

TAILORING GOALS TO THE CLIENT'S UNIQUE CONTEXT ENSURES RELEVANCE AND MAXIMIZES THERAPEUTIC OUTCOMES.

THERAPEUTIC TECHNIQUES FOR ADDRESSING SEQUENCING IN SPEECH THERAPY

INCORPORATING SEQUENCING GOALS REQUIRES A VARIETY OF INTERVENTION STRATEGIES, OFTEN COMBINING VISUAL, AUDITORY, AND KINESTHETIC CUES.

USE OF VISUAL SUPPORTS

VISUAL AIDS SUCH AS PICTURE CARDS, STORYBOARDS, AND GRAPHIC ORGANIZERS ARE COMMONLY EMPLOYED TO HELP CLIENTS VISUALIZE THE ORDER OF EVENTS OR STEPS. THESE TOOLS SERVE AS EXTERNAL SCAFFOLDS, SUPPORTING MEMORY AND ORGANIZATION.

INTERACTIVE STORYTELLING AND NARRATIVE PRACTICE

SEQUENCING GOALS SPEECH THERAPY THUS REPRESENTS A MULTIFACETED APPROACH TO IMPROVING COMMUNICATION BY TARGETING THE ORGANIZATION OF LANGUAGE AND THOUGHT.
