Lewis' *The Great Divorce* first appeared serially in the Anglican publication *The Guardian* in 14 installments from November 1944 to April 1945, the same publication that published Lewis' *The Screwtape Letters* in 1941. The woman is ashamed of what she's wearing compared to the angels, and despite the angel's insistence it is of no consequence, she can't relinquish her vanity.
