He also goes into famous cases of corruption and the politics of navigating such a large department. One of the "set pieces" of the book is the story of how DiMaggio, as part of the "Three Musketeers"—a trio that included two detectives who were close friends—investigated a series of terrifying slasher attacks on women that occurred in the city in the mid-70s. The case became one of the police department's most memorable. Among the other cases detailed in the book include how DiMaggio found himself entering the home of a crazed young man holding hostages with a shotgun; the investigation of the discovery of a headless corpse; the takedown of the Chicago "Mad Bomber"; how an anonymous audio tape provided clues to the identities of armed robbers; and the manhunt for a cop killer.
