SOUND DESIGN AND MUSIC

SOUND PLAYS AN EQUALLY VITAL ROLE, WITH A CAREFULLY CRAFTED SCORE THAT OSCILLATES BETWEEN HAUNTING MELODIES AND SUDDEN, JARRING NOISES. THIS AUDITORY LAYERING KEEPS AUDIENCES ON EDGE, SIMULATING THE PHYSICAL SENSATIONS OFTEN ACCOMPANYING FEAR. SILENCE IS ALSO STRATEGICALLY USED TO BUILD SUSPENSE, DEMONSTRATING DUMAS'S NUANCED UNDERSTANDING OF SOUND'S PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPACT.

NONLINEAR NARRATIVE STRUCTURE
