9. IRONY

12. METONYMY

METONYMY SUBSTITUTES A RELATED TERM FOR THE THING MEANT.

EXAMPLE: "THE PEN IS MIGHTIER THAN THE SWORD," WHERE "PEN" STANDS FOR WRITING AND "SWORD" FOR MILITARY FORCE.

TIPS: THIS FIGURE OF SPEECH CAN CREATE CONCISE AND IMPACTFUL EXPRESSIONS.

13. SYNECDOCHE

SYNECDOCHE USES A PART TO REPRESENT THE WHOLE OR VICE VERSA.

EXAMPLE: “ALL HANDS ON DECK,” WHERE “HANDS” REFERS TO PEOPLE.

TIPS: IT’S A HANDY TOOL FOR VIVID AND ECONOMICAL DESCRIPTIONS.

14. EUPHEMISM

EUPHEMISMS SOFTEN HARSH OR UNPLEASANT REALITIES.
