THE EARLY TRAILBLAZERS: PIONEERS OF BLACK ART

HENRY OSSAWA TANNER: A MASTER OF REALISM

HENRY OSSAWA TANNER STANDS OUT AS ONE OF THE FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN PAINTERS TO GAIN INTERNATIONAL ACCLAIM. BORN IN 1859, TANNER'S WORK OFTEN DEPICTED RELIGIOUS AND EVERYDAY SCENES WITH A PROFOUND SENSE OF HUMANITY AND REALISM. HIS PAINTING "THE BANJO LESSON" IS CELEBRATED FOR ITS DIGNIFIED PORTRAYAL OF AFRICAN AMERICAN LIFE, COUNTERING PREVAILING STEREOTYPES OF THE ERA. TANNER'S SUCCESS ABROAD, ESPECIALLY IN FRANCE, HIGHLIGHTED HOW BLACK ARTISTS COULD TRANSCEND RACIAL BARRIERS, EVEN WHEN OPPORTUNITIES WERE SCARCE AT HOME.

EDMONIA LEWIS: THE SCULPTOR OF SPIRIT

EDMONIA LEWIS WAS A REMARKABLE SCULPTOR OF MIXED AFRICAN AMERICAN AND NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE WHO GAINED RECOGNITION IN THE 19TH CENTURY. HER NEOCLASSICAL SCULPTURES OFTEN EXPLORED THEMES OF FREEDOM AND IDENTITY, SUCH AS HER FAMOUS WORK "FOREVER FREE," WHICH COMMEMORATED THE EMANCIPATION OF ENSLAVED PEOPLE. LEWIS'S RESILIENCE IN A PREDOMINANTLY WHITE, MALE-DOMINATED ART WORLD EXEMPLIFIES THE DETERMINATION OF EARLY BLACK ARTISTS TO CLAIM THEIR SPACE WITHIN THE BROADER ARTISTIC NARRATIVE.

THE HARLEM RENAISSANCE: A FLOURISHING OF BLACK ARTISTIC EXPRESSION

PERHAPS ONE OF THE MOST VIBRANT PERIODS FOR BLACK ARTISTS IN HISTORY WAS THE HARLEM RENAISSANCE DURING THE 1920S AND 1930S. THIS CULTURAL MOVEMENT CENTERED IN NEW YORK CITY BECAME A BEACON FOR AFRICAN AMERICAN CREATIVITY, INTELLECTUALISM, AND ACTIVISM.

JEAN-MICHEL BASQUIAT: FROM STREET ART TO GLOBAL FAME

THESE ISSUES HIGHLIGHT THE IMPORTANCE OF CONTINUED ADVOCACY AND SCHOLARSHIP TO ENSURE EQUITABLE VISIBILITY AND SUPPORT.

Black Artists In History

black artists in history: *A History of African-American Artists* Romare Bearden, Harry Brinton Henderson, 1993 A landmark work of art history: lavishly illustrated and extraordinary for its thoroughness, *A History of African-American Artists* -- conceived, researched, and written by the great American artist Romare Bearden with journalist Harry Henderson, who completed the work after Bearden's death in 1988 -- gives a conspectus of African-American art from the late eighteenth century to the present. It examines the lives and careers of more than fifty signal African-American

artists, and the relation of their work to prevailing artistic, social, and political trends both in America and throughout the world. Beginning with a radical reevaluation of the enigma of Joshua Johnston, a late eighteenth-century portrait painter widely assumed by historians to be one of the earliest known African-American artists, Bearden and Henderson go on to examine the careers of Robert S. Farrington expertly guides us through the fertile period of the Harlem Renaissance and the New Negro Movement, which produced an entirely new crop of artists who consciously imbued their work with a social and political agenda, and through the tumultuous, explosive years of the civil rights movement. Drawing on revealing interviews with numerous contemporary artists, such as Betye Saar, Faith Ringgold, Nanette Carter, Camille Billops, Xenobia Bailey, and many others, the second half of *Creating Their Own Image* probes more recent stylistic developments, such as abstraction, conceptualism, and post-modernism, never losing sight of the struggles and challenges that have consistently influenced this body of work. Weaving together an expansive collection of artists, styles, and periods, Farrington argues that for centuries African-American women artists

have created an alternative vision of how women of color can, are, and might be represented in American culture.
