THIS APPROACH OFFERS A MORE AUTHENTIC AND LESS SANITIZED VIEW OF THE WORLD, WHICH CAN BE BOTH A STRENGTH AND A CHALLENGE IN CHILDREN'S LITERATURE.

THE STYLISTIC FEATURES OF TED HUGHES POEMS FOR CHILDREN

CHALLENGES AND CRITICISMS OF TED HUGHES POEMS FOR CHILDREN

COMPARED TO MORE TRADITIONAL CHILDREN'S POETRY. THIS NECESSITATES ADULT MEDIATION TO HELP CHILDREN UNPACK THE POEMS' MEANINGS AND THEMES, WHICH MAY LIMIT THEIR INDEPENDENT ENJOYMENT FOR SOME.

NEVERTHELESS, MANY LITERARY SCHOLARS ARGUE THAT HUGHES' APPROACH RESPECTS CHILDREN'S INTELLECTUAL CAPACITY AND EMOTIONAL DEPTH, ENCOURAGING A MATURE ENGAGEMENT WITH POETRY AND THE NATURAL WORLD.
